Exhibiting is Easy:

- Go to the check in table to receive your personal exhibitor number and one exhibit slip fore each of your entries
- Write your "Exhibitor Number" in the box at the top of the slip. Your name is not put on the slip.
- Refer to the show schedule for the "Class Number". It goes in the appropriate box.
- If you know the specific name or variety of your exhibit, write that in the "Exhibit Description" space. Some classes require this, others do not. If it is not required, this space can be left empty.
- Place your exhibit with its slip on the showbench in the area specified by its class number.


Voting for Your Favorites:

Everyone gets to vote for his or her favourite in each of the 3 general categories. You have 3 colored ballots. To make your vote count, you must use the right colour for each category.

- Pink for Flowers: Classes 1 to 25
- Green for Vegetables, Herbs & Fruits: Classes 26 to 40
- Orange for Floral Art: Classes 41

NEXT MONTH'S PRESENTATION:

"Rain gardens" are sprouting up everywhere. But surely every garden in Metro Vancouver is a rain garden? Not guite! Learn what rain gardens are, the many benefits they provide, and why they're essential to environmental sustainability and salmon. You will enjoy a photo tour of several North Delta school and community rain gardens, gleaning ideas for using rain gardens large or small to create drought-resilience, to reduce water pollution and/or to solve property drainage issues in an economical way.

As Rain Gardens Coordinator for Cougar Creek Streamkeepers, Deborah Jones has been involved in the design, construction, planting and maintenance of 28 rain gardens. She also advises The Nature Trust of British Columbia on their rain garden grant program.

PRESIDENT'S CORNER by Lorna:

Larkspur is the English Style Flower of the month. The US Style Birth Flower is Water Lily. Larkspur is more common in gardens in England than here in Canada. It is the annual version of Delphinium, thus it's similar appearance. It comes in a range of colours, each with a different symbolic meaning. Blue symbolizes levity, lightness, joyful & fickleness; Pink, contrariness; White, a happy nature; and Purple, first love. Did you know that Larkspur is toxic to humans? The stem and seeds contain alkaloids. They can cause severe digestive discomfort if ingested and, also, skin irritation. Tall Larkspur is a native perennial weed in the western USA and is a significant cause of cattle poisoning on rangeland. Amazingly though, domestic sheep are not affected by the toxins in Larkspurs so are sometimes used to help eradicate the plants on cattle ranges.
