THE WAY THINGS WERE IN 1934 WHEN **NWHS WAS BORN:**

Researching back copies of The British Columbian, an excellent source of local history, opens windows to what it was like to live in New Westminster in 1934.

BC's premier, Thomas Dufferin Pattullo presented a huge deficit budget. There was controversy regarding the proposed high-level bridge over the Fraser. Should tolls be charged? The Royal Columbian Hospital needed more money. The global economy was a real mess. B C, along with the rest of the world was dragging itself out of The Great Depression. Global unrest was lurking: riots in France, Mussolini takes power in Italy and there were demands to re-arm in Germany.

The City of New Westminster and life within it were very different from today. It was a major deep sea port with over 30 ships visiting monthly. Phone numbers (if you had one) were 2, 3 for 4 digits. Whereas white workers at Fraser Mills were paid 35¢ per hour, "Orientals" got 25¢. The average annual income in BC was \$350, drastically down from the pre-Depression \$600. A house could be rented for \$8 per month. Purchasing an older house cost \$550, a newer one \$1500. Macintosh apples were 7 pounds for 25¢, butter 3 pounds for 87¢, fresh rhubarb pies 20¢ each and loin lamb chops 2 pounds for 35¢. New car prices ranged from \$700 to \$1700. St Mary's Hospital got a new "shock-proof" X-ray machine, the most advanced at the time and the only one in BC. Grappling (wrestling) was a popular spectator sport. The society page was thick with news such as "Mrs Braden of Vancouver was the guest of her sister, Mrs Middleton, for a few days last week".

In horticultural news, Bradner was earning a place on the map as a bulb growing centre. Also of note, in a garden on 6th Avenue, the "primrose display elicits the admiration of flower lovers." Some of the primula descended from plants brought here on the first boats reaching New Westminster by the way of Cape Horn. The Burquitlam and Surrey Women's Institutes held flower shows and teas. The South Burnaby Horticultural Society and the Farmer's Institute held a joint meeting. On March 21st there was the first mention of the birth of our club. Then, in the paper, on April 25, the headlines "Horticultural Society Plans Show on May 1". The article detailed the show schedule and revealed plans that the newly formed **New Westminster Horticultural Society** would hold a parlour show every month.

NWHS has the status of being the oldest general gardening club in BC in continuous existence. "Continuous" is the key word. Other clubs may have been founded before us but they have had years in which they were temporarily disbanded. There are specialty clubs much older than NWHS.`

PLANT SALE:

We're down to the crunch! Less than 1 month to go! As potting tapers, our focus switches to pricing, publicity and the sale itself.

Phone numbers and email addresses for Sharon, Terri and Audrey is listed under "Contacts" elsewhere in the newsletter

Potting: If you haven't raided your garden for extra and/or unwanted plants, do it as soon as possible so they become established in their pots. The current rain is great—you don't have to be a slave to watering. They shouldn't dry out. We want those roots to be happy.

Pots: The stock-pile is in Audrey's carport and the stash of certain sizes, especially 1 gal, has been depleted. Please drop off any extras you have. Please no drop off after the sale date. Contact Audrey if you are looking for pots.

Growing from Seed? Terri CK is the go-to person for potting-on soil.

Labels: Please refer to the March newsletter about what is expected on your plant labels. If you need blanks, contact Audrey. If you anticipate needing a large number, tell her as soon as possible so she can make sure you get them. If you need to borrow a Sharpie, Audrey is the person. If you need some plant identification or label advice, guess who to talk with? Audrey

What are you donating? We would like to know in advance what you have potted. We have found in the past that a picture can ensure a sell-out. Once you have a list, email it to Audrey so she can get a photo sign made up. But don't wait until the last minute. If you can send her a photo, all the better. If you are growing veggies, please tell her. It makes it so much easier to be warned in advance of what to expect.

Pricing: Now is a good time to evaluate the worth of your plants. Everything must be priced prior to arrival at the sale site. Check the 2019 pricing guideline on page 4. We don't want you to undervalue your plants but, alternately, we want to sell everything. If you still have trouble deciding, contact Sharon Seki about a week before the sale. She will zip over and give advice. Please don't wait until last minute.

Publicity: It's time to ramp-up getting the word out. Grab a bunch of the small sale notices to give to your friends. The letter size posters are available tonight. They are intended for bulletin boards. Post it as soon as possible. Take one if you know of a good place—please tell us its intended destination so we do not make specific effort to go there only to find a poster. There will be a clipboard tonight for this. For our lawn signs, we have been searching out high foot traffic locations such as near elementary schools or parks. Most signs have been assigned but if we have overlooked you tell us tonight. Your lawn sign should go up about 1 week before the sale—aim for Fri, Apr 26. Many thanks.

Plant Delivery: We would like all plants delivered to the school roundabout Fri May 3, between 5 & 7:30pm. Please ensure they are well potted, labelled, priced and watered. Watering on site may be tricky. If you have plants for the sale but will be out of town on sale weekend, Audrey is willing to babysit them until sale time. There is some space in her greenhouse.



Also, there are all sorts of jobs for strong bodies who don't necessarily need to know plant details. If you are a new member, why not give it it a try? You'll be pleased that you did. It's not a huge time commitment and you will feel you really belong to NWHS. Check with Sharon tonight—or contact her when you know your schedule better.

Boxes: Of course, we need cardboard flats/boxes. It is best to drop them off at the sale on Sat.

NWSS ATHLETICS MANURE SALE:

This popular fund-raiser for the high school athletics is a bit later this year. Why? So it can coincide with our plant sale. For details of the mushroom manure sale and to download the order form, go to www. nwss.ca. The info says the sale is May 2-4 but that is when they plan to start deliveries. They hope most of the people, who want to order for delivery, have done it much in advance of that date. Just fill out the form and mail it and your payment to NWSS Manure Sale, 835 8th St. New Westminster, V3M 3S9. Alternately, you can drop into the school office between 9am and 4pm weekdays. There is a minimum of 2 bags for freedelivery. The students will have manure kiosk at our sale on May 4 as well but quantities will be limited. Fine if you want just a bag or two. If you want more, they will gladly take your order on our sale date. Each bag is \$5 and will cover an area 3ft x 3ft to a 2in depth.



BOTANICAL PRINT WORKSHOP:

Reserve a couple hours on June 1st to learn how to create something beautiful. Under the guidance of club member Terry Rammell, you will print leaves and flowers from your garden onto cotton rag paper. The method is simple. You will become addicted. Talk with Terry tonight about what is involved...or check next month's newsletter for more details. 2 sessions are possible. There will be a maximum of 10 participants per session. The morning session (10am-noon) has priority. It will be filled first. If numbers warrant, an afternoon session (2-4pm) will also be held. The location is Audrey's carport. 2019 SPRING PLANT SALE PRICING GUIDELINES

We aim to price our plants at 1/2 to 2/3 of regular retail price of an equivalent healthy plant. The prices listed are for an average filled pot.

- * If your pot is less full or smaller plants drop by \$1-\$2 on the price below.
- * If fuller or larger plant than average add \$1-\$2 to the price.
- * If you have a named variety or a rarer plant then add \$2-\$3 to the price.
